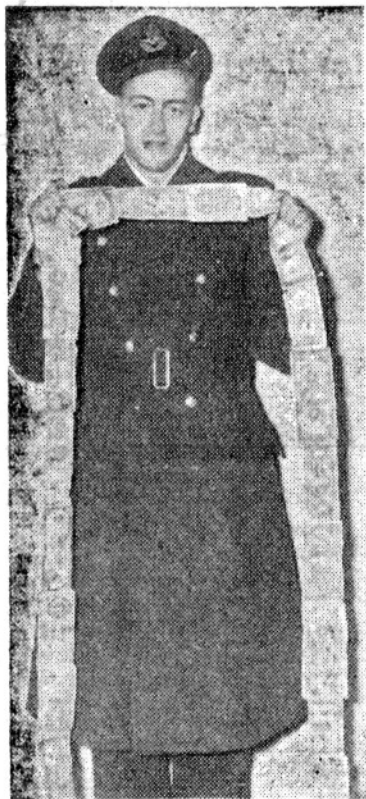


Has "Short Snorter" Bills of 20 Countries

Restaurant License Is Cancelled

On the grounds of unsanitary condition of the premises of the United Lunch on Queen Street, the City Council Monday evening instructed the City Clerk to cancel the license issued to that restaurant.

This action was taken when Council adopted the Finance Committee's report, presented by Ald. Walker S. Pettit, Finance Chairman, and seconded by Ald. Ernie Nurse.

The Committee reported that the Board of Health had complained of unsanitary conditions, which the proprietors had refused to remedy.

Ald. Howard Winter, the only Council member to vote against the recommendation, said he considered the action too drastic.

Ald. G. Frank Sterne, Chairman of the Board of Health, said he was prepared to resign if Council did not act in the matter.

"Short-snorter" paper currency representing 20 different countries on five different continents, are the proud possession of FO. T. Hugh Bremner, City, a navigator with Ferry Command, who is spending a few days' leave with his wife and two children here at 171 Sydenham Street.

The son of Acting Fire Chief George A. Bremner and Mrs. Bremner, FO. Bremner has flown approximately 110,000 miles during the past year and one-half, during which time he has been with the Ferry Command.

"We had an early breakfast in Africa last Wednesday, and sat down to supper the same night in Montreal," said FO. Bremner, whose last trip was to Iraq.

His first "short-snorter" bill was acquired on the African Gold Coast. Since then he has added to his collection, paper money from Trinidad, The Azores, Curacao, Italy, Russia, England, Algeria, French Morocco, Bermuda, Tripolitania, Egypt, the United States, Brazil, British Guiana, West Africa and Iraq.

FO. Bremner also got an original French bill while he was in French Morocco. His Italian bills were acquired when he was in Sicily, and they represent both the old Italian currency and the Allied Military currency—"invasion money" it is called. The "invasion money" bears on its back the four freedoms of the Atlantic Charter.

The only country to which FO. Bremner has been that he has not procured a bill, is Jamaica.

During his year-and-one-half with the Ferry Command, he has flown in Liberators, Lancasters, Catalinas, Mitchells, Dakotas and Venturas.

He has been a passenger on many other types of planes, however, when he returned from each of the various countries.

The trips usually involve a few days' stay in the foreign countries which are the pilots' destinations, and FO. Bremner has brought back for his wife numerous pieces of jewelry and other presents which he has bought in the far-away cities. Mrs. Bremner has some especially lovely pieces of hand-made Peruvian silver.

FO. Bremner was employed at the local radio station before he enlisted in the R. C. A. F. in January of 1942. Another employee of the radio station, and a close friend of FO. Bremner, William D. Erdely, 81 Richmond Street, is at the same station, and has been flying bombers to various parts of the world for more than three years.

FO. Bremner declined to take any credit for his part in the war as a ferry navigator, however, but stated: "Those fellows who are slugging it out day after day in Germany, Holland, and in fact, on all the battle fronts, are the ones who are really doing the work in this war. They deserve all the credit."
